

Goals of today's session:

- 1) Highlight benefits of partnerships between Continuums of Care (local homelessness response systems) and Tribes.
- 2) Learn from a local partnership that included Tribes and Tribal lands in the Point-in-Time homelessness count.





California Interagency Council on Homelessness

- Secretary and Director-level representatives from 19 state departments and agencies and two community leaders appointed by the state legislature.
- Aligns state departments and agencies to develop policies and identify resources, benefits, and services to prevent and end homelessness in California.
 - Action Plan to Prevent & Address Homelessness
- Meets quarterly and is supported by multiple groups such as an Advisory Committee, Lived Experience
 Advisory Board and a future Tribal Advisory Board.





Tribal Homelessness Data

- Homelessness, traditionally, did not exist in Tribal Communities.
 - It was created by federal, local, and state actions or inactions.
- Tribes are usually not included in the data, yet they experience the highest disparities of homelessness.
- Up to 40% of community members are experiencing homelessness among California Tribes.

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


Purpose and Benefits of PIT Counts

- The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires a Point-in-Time (PIT) Count of every person experiencing homelessness in the US during the last 10 days of January
- Meet federal data reporting requirements
- Develop valid & accurate demographic data about homelessness on tribal land
- Retain & improve funding
- Increase general community awareness
- Link to strategic, program & policy planning including "mainstreaming" to general services
- Enable the CoC to effectively measure program & policy impact



Tribal Data Points






Key Steps for Tribal Participation in the PIT Count

- Local CoC should endorse/support the effort
- Identify tribal contact(s) to organize canvassing of tribal lands
- Tribal and CoC leaders MUST agree on expectations for PIT effort
- Tribal leadership organizes outreach teams (CoC pays)
- CoC trains all participants to ensure HUD compliance and quality control
- CoC supplies maps, field data collection tools and general support for tribal teams
- Tribal leaders review data for reporting accuracy
- CoC reports findings to tribal leadership in forum of their choice


