



TRIBES AND CONTINUUMS OF CARE: PARTNERSHIPS & POINT-IN-TIME COUNTS ON TRIBAL LANDS

Why it Matters

California Tribal Relatives are experiencing the *highest disparities of homelessness* and have less access to funding and culturally appropriate programs than the general population.

Local homelessness response systems, also known as Continuums of Care (CoCs), have the opportunity to partner with Tribes to improve data visibility and support the ending of homelessness for all California Communities.

Point-in-Time (PIT) counts are an annual count of the number of individuals experiencing homelessness. Including Tribal lands in these counts provides clear benefits both for Tribes and CoCs.

Benefits for Tribal Communities

- There are currently no accurate sources of Tribal homelessness data across California.
- Participation in Point in Time counts uplifts data on how many individuals are experiencing unsheltered homelessness on Tribal lands.
- Having this data helps to ensure that the Tribal Community's needs are recognized and can be
 used to help secure funding and resources for Tribal Communities, as well as to help inform
 advocacy and shape policy decisions.

Benefits for Continuums of Care

- Including Tribes in PIT counts gives CoCs a more complete and accurate picture of homelessness across their geography.
- Tribal participation strengthens the credibility of the data, helps identify service gaps (especially in rural or reservation areas often overlooked), and fosters stronger government-to-government collaboration.
- This inclusion allows CoCs to design more effective regional strategies, improve equity in resource allocation, and demonstrate compliance with state and federal expectations around engaging Tribal Communities.
